More than half of the European textile companies now specialise in technical textiles. They produce, for example, fabrics for civil engineering, traffic, safety, medicine and sports, and develop materials with novel substances and technical innovation for entirely new products. Consequently, new career opportunities in textiles are opening up in the technical areas that require a lot of expertise and innovative spirit.

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
